With your partnership, our SVdP conferences have completed over **1,500 home visits in the past year, helping more than 3,000 people.** Additionally, our 11 incredible conferences distributed more than \$900,000 in financial aid, and almost half was used directly for rental assistance.

Finally Arriving Home

HE LAST TIME Monica had a roof over her head she was 17 years old and in her final year of foster care. Now 49 years old, Monica lived for decades as an "anchor-out" in Richardson Bay. This meant she was living on a dilapidated vessel anchored out in the bay, something many locals claim is illegal and poses a threat to safety and the marine environment. She had nowhere else to go.

Eventually Monica lost her boat and found herself truly lost. She soon started residing at homeless encampments in Sausalito and Novato when she came onto St. Vincent de Paul's radar. Monica was initially a decliner of services due to her involvement in previous case management programs in which she struggled to connect and manifest change, causing a deep mistrust in community partners.

Known for our persistance in making sure everyone has access to care, St. Vincent de Paul case managers were able to build a rapport with Monica and assigned her to a female case manager, something we found she was much more comfortable with.

Moving forward, she was assigned as a client under the **Encampment Resolution Program (ERP).** This program works to resolve encampments in Marin County through intensive case management and help in obtaining permanent supportive housing. We had her signed up for permanent supportive housing within the first three weeks of engagement.

Monica's case manager met with her two to three times a week at the homeless encampment she was residing at and continually proved to her that **she could trust SVdP** and accept our resources. Hope was something she finally allowed herself to have.

Something clicked and Monica was suddenly determined to engage with our program to secure a Section 8 Housing Voucher. The process of leaving the encampment was slow and steady but SVdP was able to house her in a hotel for 90 days as we waited for her voucher to process to **get her in stable and safe housing as soon as possible.** This helped Monica stabilize, save money, and separate herself from the trauma of living in a homeless encampment as a single woman.

Today Monica has been in permanent supportive housing for seven months and her transformation is astounding. Walking up to her beautiful apartment, you immediately know its her home as she is always singing as you walk to her front door, excited to greet her guests. Monica has waited a lifetime to finally find a home to call her own and is truly content for the first time. **You did this for Monica. Thank you.**

Together we are Changing Lives

HILE IT MAY SEEM like a convenient cliché, it is the honest truth that the work of St. Vincent de Paul wouldn't be possible without the outpouring of love, support, and compassion from our gracious benefactors.

With the aid of your generosity, SVdP serves more than 8,000 individuals, families, older adults, and Veterans every single year. To express our gratitude, we would like to share the stories of several clients who have had their lives changed thanks to you.

Cate was an ambitious young woman who wanted to go back to school. In a dire financial situation and without reliable housing, she turned to St. Vincent de Paul who helped her find a stable place to live so she could focus on chasing her dreams. She now works full-time for a social services agency.

Kasey was a young woman in recovery. With the

support of St. Vincent de Paul, she was able to stay sober, find full-time employment, and receive aid from SVdP to move into a safe environment where she could be near her support network.

Mason was a young man who was sleeping in his car and working overnight shifts as a security guard. Unfortunately, his car was repossessed and he found himself without shelter. St. Vincent de Paul stepped in and got him a place of his own where he could start a new chapter in life.

Steve and Isabelle had recently suffered a job loss, and consequently were forced to live in their car and in places not meant for human habitation with their two children. In search for resources, Steve came across our Help Desk Program, the only one of its kind in Marin providing walk-up housing search assistance and direct client aid. They were recommended for SVdP's Rapid Rehousing Program,



a system that quickly engages with those newly experiencing homelessness to restore them back to stable housing and prevent their entry into crowded shelters or housing programs.

Thanks to their determination to give their children a bright future and with the aid of SVdP, they were able to secure housing within a month of working with us.

Gloria and her young daughter fled their home country of Cuba with the hopes of a better future in the United States. She was starting at square one with a limited English speaking capability, no ready source of employmnent, and a child to provide for. SVdP was able to step in and secure them with resources and a stable place to call home.

James is a single father who came to SVdP in the hope of finding a place to call home for him and his son. As he was homeless. James was unable to keep his son and he was subsequently sent to live with other family members. With the aid of SVdP, James is working full-time and lives in permanent supportive housing and is able to keep his son with him. He no longer has to worry about where they will spend the night.

Julio came to our Help Desk Program in search of aid to move out of his car and into stable housing.


With a long history of alcholism, Julio was at a point where he was ready to turn his life around and have a safe place to call home. Thanks to the help of SVdP, Julio was able to join our Sober Living Environment Program, find employment and get back on his feet. He is now working full-time and lives in permanent supportive housing where he has been able to start fresh just like he always wanted.

Georgia is a young woman who experienced years of domestic violence and finally escaped only to find herself unsure on how to function alone. The first time living on her own, St. Vincent de Paul was able to step in and provide her with a support network and give her the resources she needed to get employed and find stability in functioning as an individual with freedom.

All of these people have started a new chapter in their lives thanks to you. Your generosity makes it possible for St. Vincent de Paul to say "yes" more often than "no" to clients and get them the aid they so desparately need. We are so grateful.

Every time you donate to St. Vincent de Paul, you are helping real people in our community that are grateful beyond words. At SVdP, we know that homelessness doesn't define a person. It can happen to anyone, and for this reason we are dedicated to ensuring our community will always have a safe space to turn to in their moment of need. You are helping us changing lives. Thank you.

unity. She has been deeply involved with public service for much of her life and has also encouraged her children and fellow community members to follow in her footsteps.

A physician at UCSF and mother of four, Judith has always felt that service and thinking about the wellbeing of others is critical in shaping the best version of ourselves. With her children in school, she first got involved in making toiletry kits, Christmas bag gifts, and lunches through their required service hours.

"I think it's really important to instill those values in our children of how they can help and what they can do for other people," Judith said.



When the pandemic shut everything down in early 2020, Judith found herself looking for ways she could immediately help the less fortunate in our community. She found her answer in St. Vincent de Paul.

Familiar with our organization through past volunteer work in SVdP's Free Dining Room, Judith knew that we would need extra hands in feeding our population during lockdown. In response, she began making bagged lunches for our hungry neighbors.

Judith was quick to involve her fellow community members and encouraged them to drop off any food items they had for a bagged lunch such as snacks or drinks, which her children and their friends would then put together and get ready for drop-off at our kitchen. Judith has helped make and deliver more than 5,000 meals for our community since March 2020.

With a schedule of making between 50 to 100 bagged lunches twice a month, we could not be more grateful for her steadfast support. It's people like Judith that are keeping our community fed.

"I'm very interested in continuing to find ways to encourage not only young people, but everyone to actively do things to help the people in our community," Judith said.

Due to her clear dedication to our community, Judith was asked by our Executive Board Treasurer Duane Geck and his wife Terri to join our Board of Directors and get further involved with SVdP. To our upmost excitement, she accepted in January 2022. Judith is currently serving as our Secretary.

"St. Vincent's gets out there and meets people where they are," Judith said. "They put in a lot of effort to not only find housing for people, but also to help make it sustainable."

St. Vincent de Paul is dedicated to serving every client that comes to us for help. We believe in the dignity of all people and see potential in even the most seemingly hopeless of cases. **No one is turned away when they come to St. Vincent de Paul.**

Judith has seen this through her own experiences at our Free Dining Room, when after one occasion of dropping off bagged lunches, she was warmly greeted by a member of our kitchen staff and quickly asked if she was here for a meal.

"He wasn't going to ask me any questions about who I was or why I needed a lunch, he was just ready to give it to me," Judith said. "I think it's that attitude of whoever comes, we will help, and that's what we want to be fostering for ourselves and for our children."

Judith has seen how we believe in the dignity of all people, foster independence in our clients, and support them every step of the way in their life's journey. It's through this philosophy that we are able to have a 95% success rate in keeping our clients housed. Thank you Judith for all that you do to help keep St. Vincent de Paul a pillar for our community.
