Our vulnerable neighbors have depended on St. Vincent de Paul since our introduction to Marin in 1946. Thanks to your support, we have been able to continuously bless our community with love and dignity. Your unrelenting compassion for those less fortunate ensure that our mission to end hunger and homelessness in Marin remains firmly unchanged. Thank you for allowing us this honor. **We cannot do our work without you.** 

For so many of those we serve, hope for a brighter tomorrow feels like a distant idea. To them, it may feel like the world is against them and that there is no way back to a place of stability. **You answered their call for help.** Because of you, we are able to meet people where they are and give them all the hope, encouragement, and resources they need to better their situations. **Together we are changing lives.** 

As the following pages of this newsletter explore, you will discover stories of newfound hope and dedication to creating a brighter Marin County for all. You will hear stories of new beginnings and showcases of outstanding community involvement. Every day we are in awe of not only the steadfast support of our community, but also the incredible transformations of our clients during their life journeys. **You made this possible!** 

We remain committed to ending homelessness in Marin and your kind generosity has allowed us to **house 136 individuals** in the last year alone with the assistance of one or more SVdP safety net programs. This is no small feat. You are getting people off the streets and into warm and safe housing. Thank you for putting a roof over our community's head and allowing them dignity.

With your partnership, our SVdP conferences have completed over **1,700 home visits** in the past year, helping more than **3,200 people**. Additionally, our 11 incredible conferences distributed more than **\$750,000 in financial aid,** and almost half was used directly for rental assistance.

### **New Beginnings**

T. VINCENT DE PAUL'S SOBER LIVING ENVIRONMENT (SLE) PROGRAM is a supportive housing placement that provides an opportunity for individuals who have experienced intense hardships related to drug misuse, mental health, and various health challenges to seek another chance. This program serves clients on Medi-Cal, those experiencing homelessness, and people newly graduated from detox or treatment and who are sober to gain financial assistance for moving into an SLE. For merely \$3,600 we can house an individual for three to four months while they work on their sobriety.

Please enjoy the following note of gratitude from an individual you've already helped.

#### Sabrina's Story

"I want to share a little story about myself and how my journey of getting sober started. I was a homeless addict and reached a point where I was tired of living that lifestyle. I was ready for change.

I spent some time in rehab and knew that if I wanted to stay sober, I would need to look for a Sober Living Environment (SLE). My recovery coach introduced me to Matt Smith, a case manager at St. Vincent de Paul. He got me a spot in a local SLE and paid for my rent. It was crucial to my recovery.

I was so thankful that I was given the opportunity to receive the help I needed to stay sober. Not having to worry about the finances allowed me to dedicate myself to the program. This changed my life.

Since recovering, I have begun volunteering at local organizations to try to support people who are going through the same struggles that I was. St. Vincent de Paul is doing a great job. You change so many lives. I am thankful that I was one of the individuals chosen to get the help they needed.

You have no idea how this has impacted my life, my family, and my friends. I'm in a good position right now and I can't complain. Thank you!"



### **Finding Hope in the Darkest of Times**

LIFE DEFINED BY HURT. Clara had only known pain, first surviving her abusive childhood home, only to find herself married to an abusive husband later in life. She just couldn't take it anymore.

In a fit of panic, Clara fled to the streets on her own and spent years keeping to herself, developing psychological illnesses and dealing with a mounting dependancy on alcohol. This was the only way she knew how to cope with her unbearable reality. **There was no hope left inside her.** 

Her presence in the unhoused community eventually caught St. Vincent de Paul's eye. Engaging with her and building a trusting relationship took time but was nonetheless extremely rewarding for both Clara and our case managers. SVdP was able to get Clara temporarily housed in a transitional housing program while we worked tirelessly to find a

more permanent situation.

At the same time, her dependent relationship with alcohol was catching up with her. She often required emergency medical care. The fact that this seemed like a dire case didn't scare our case managers away. At St. Vincent de Paul, we refuse to give up. We believe in the dignity of all people and will always fight for those who seek our aid.

A light appeared at the end of the tunnel when our case managers were able to secure an apartment for Clara. Unfortunately having a roof over her head didn't mean that her mental illnesses suddenly disappeared. She was terrorized by her own mind, a prisoner of delusions and increasingly afraid and suspicious of everything and everyone. The anguish of her realities were too heavy a load to bear.

She just wanted to be better, wanted to be happy and relieved to be in the new, safe situation St.



Vincent de Paul had worked relentlessly to give her. It wasn't that easy. Even in her most unsure of moments, she knew change had to come from within and she would need to take recovery seriously to create the life for herself she had always dreamed of.



Clara guit drinking on her own out of sheer determination. She is now four years sober, no easy feat and a massive milestone on her way to a full recovery. Secondly, she started medication to give her control of her own mind back. While this has certainly improved her quality of life, Clara continues to fight the demons in her head and seek the perfect medical combination to free her completely.

Despite this, she remains humble and frugal, existing happily on less than \$400 per month. She takes great care of her appearance and is sweet and kind to everyone she meets. She knows all too well that there could always be a deep, dark story behind every smiling face she sees. Kindness to all and acting as a safe space to everyone who crosses her path is her small way of making amends.

Clara has been a client of St. Vincent de Paul for more than five years. To this day, she receives ongoing care from our case managers. When she first began engaging with SVdP, there was still a lot of sentiment in the community that case managers should move along from clients after getting them housed. Clara is only one example for why this is not always the best time to leave a client, right as they begin the difficult journey of navigating their new life on their own.

St. Vincent de Paul case managers were at the forefront of the conversation, advocating for an ongoing relationship with clients, arguing it only



makes sense after having spent so much time building a trusting relationship with them. We saw how keeping clients involved in case management led to higher success rates, especially among chronically homeless invididuals like Clara who require difficult long-term work to make the necessary changes needed to build more fulfilling and sustainable lives for themselves.

All of this critical dialogue among community partners paid off. Today, it is common practice for case managers in Marin to maintain an ongoing relationship with clients at a frequency and intensity that best suits their individual needs. The compassion and dedication of our case managers, paired with the support of our community is what has allowed us to ensure people like Clara will never be alone again. Thank you for giving Clara hope.
